

RULES



Split the components evenly

You must do at least one cross and one direct in every round

You cannot do both the closing and opening in a round



You are timed

5 mins for MIL/70 mins for case in chief, not including objections



Don't read

Memorize what you can, but notes are OKAY


You are expected to use the well.



You are scored on professionalism

Dress professionally

Address the judge as "Your Honor" and remember to stand



MOCK TRIAL COMPETITION STRUCTURE

CALLING THE CASE



INTRODUCE YOURSELF

Prosecution goes first, then defense,

"Good morning, your Honor. (Name) and (Name), representing (the defendant/state.)



Optional, but helpful

Ask about pre-marking exhibits, moving about the well, invoking the rule etc.

MOTIONS IN LIMINE

STRUCTURE


- Limited to 3 parts per side
- Remember that you only have 5 minutes!
- Either partner can argue

WHAT IS A MIL?

- Motions to exclude evidence that is too prejudicial to just object to when they come up
 - EXAMPLE: "Isn't it true that you killed someone before?"
- MIL's are purely preliminary -- the judge can always change their mind
- If something is excluded, you can still ask to approach and bring it up later

MAKING THE MOTION

- Explain the evidence that you want excluded and under what rule of evidence
- Keep it short!
- Give context- the judge knows nothing about the case



START WITH A HOOK AND A HEADLINE

- Something catchy that explains your theme
- "if the glove doesn't fit, you must acquit"

•TELL A STORY ARRANGED AROUND THE THEORY OF THE CASE

- Present tense and easy to understand
- Don't argue

•ANTICIPATE THE OTHER SIDE,

- Don't hide evidence
- Get in your main points

DISCUSS THE BURDEN OF PROOF

• By a preponderance of the evidence

•CALL FOR ACTION

• By the end of this trial, you will find the only result that the evidence supports, and justice demands




DIRECTS


- Ask open ended questions no leading the witness
- Let the witness tell the story. You are just there to keep the witness on topic
- Prepare your witness well. Make sure they know the facts
- Personalize your witness to give them credibility
- Keep your witness organized
- Listen to your witness's answers, follow up if needed.
- Anticipate cross questions and stay ahead of it.

CROSSES

- You are the star of the show
 - The attorney should be talking most of the time
 - Tell the story through the questions, not the answers
- Leading questions only!!!
 - Keep the witness from talking too much about their side
 - Show that you are in control
 - Ask questions that you KNOW have "yes" or "no" answer
- Make your case
 - Get evidence that supports your case theory
 - Discredit the witness
 - Attack the witness's testimony
- Be organized
 - Know the facts
 - Don't write out your questions but use an outlines
 - Don't let the witness get you off topic

CLOSINGS





·Be respectful, be professional

- Judges could be your potential employers!
- •Don't be a jerk (witnesses too!)
 - Please play fair and within the rules
 - Don't make up facts
- ·Have a good time!
- •Don't stress and try your best

You must show a good faith effort – you cannot waive a round.


